



The International *Back to Back* Wool Challenge Story

In 1811 at Newbury in Berkshire, UK, a one thousand pound wager was made to make a coat from the sheep's back to a man's back in one day.

Watched by 5000 people, the coat was completed in thirteen hours.

The sheep was eaten with much quaffing of beer to celebrate.

Today's Challenge began in 1992 when Richard Snow, a keen young spinner at the Scottish Wool Centre at Aberfoyle in Scotland, developed thyroid cancer. His desire to raise funds for cancer research sparked off their **Back to Back Challenge**, a competition very similar to that run almost two hundred years ago.

The event created enormous interest in the UK, not only because of the clever wool promotion but also because of the funds raised for cancer research.

That same year, Australia held a similar contest.

Teams representing football clubs The Cats, Geelong, Victoria and the West Coast Eagles, Western Australia competed in a race to spin & knit a football scarf from freshly shorn wool.

When Australian Wool Showcase member, Wendy Dennis took part in the 1994 Fourth World Congress on Coloured Sheep at York University, UK, she also visited the Scottish Wool Centre. With similar annual competitions held in Scotland and Australia, combined with fundraising for Cancer Research, the seed was sown for a combined International Competition and the rules were developed to suit.

Teams consist of a blade shearer, a sheep and seven handspinners & knitters. Team nominate time keepers, assessors & coordinators monitor each team competing at their own wool related venue. All teams follow the identical Challenge rules and pattern exactly as they are written.

The 1995 inaugural Challenge with nine teams competing from three Australian States, Scotland and the Shetland Isles, was won by the **Shetland Isles in 5 hours 57 minutes 58 seconds.**

Over 1,350 Pounds was raised by the Scottish Wool Centre for the Cancer Research Campaign.

1996 saw twenty two teams competing, sixteen in Australia from four States. USA entered a team from Michigan and the UK had teams from Scotland, the Shetland Isles, Devon and Cambridge.

Again, the Shetlands were unbeatable, breaking their blistering 1995 record by 39 minutes.

They clipped another nine minutes off the next year.

In 2004, **Merriwa**, New South Wales, Australia broke the 5 hour barrier.

Their time:- **4 hours 51 minutes 14 seconds** recorded for the first time in the *Guinness World Records* book.

Merriwa also raised a record **AUD\$15,000 for Cancer Research.**

Ireland, Wales, Canada, New Zealand, Japan, Czech Republic, Republic of South Africa & The Netherlands have since joined the Challenge.

The Netherlands broke the Guinness World Record in 2017 in a time of **4 hours 45 minutes 53 seconds.**

In just a few short years, the Challenge has developed at a remarkable rate.

It is a simple and direct method of promoting wool from 'sheep's back to spinners back' using the ancient skills of blade shearing, spinning and knitting.

And it is timed to coincide with Australia's long weekend in June and the tourist summer season in the Northern Hemisphere

Australia Regains *Back to Back* World Wool Trophy

Media Release 2018

After six years in second place, an Australian team has regained the coveted Scottish Wool Centre's International Wool Challenge Trophy. The Spinning Knitwits team of seven handspinners & knitters & a blade shearer shored a sheep, handspun and knitted a jumper in a time of 6 hours 08 minutes 37 seconds to win this year's **24th International *Back to Back* Wool Challenge**.

The team was hosted by Tocal Agricultural College at Paterson in New South Wales.

A team from **The Netherlands** last year broke the Guinness World Record in a time of **4 hours 45 minutes & 53 seconds** previously held by **Australia's Merriwa Jumbucks**, NSW and originally held by the Shetland Isles, Scotland.

USA gained second place, their time being 6 hours 11 minutes 38 seconds with Canada third.

Australia competed against teams from USA & across Canada.

Each team consisted of a **blade shearer**, a country of origin **sheep** and **seven handspinners** (with spinning wheels) and **knitters** who follow the identical Challenge rules and pattern to knit **the adult size jumper**.

The Australian team shored a Merino X Border Leicester Cross sheep and spun on Majacraft, Ashford & Kromski spinning wheels.

The Back to Back teams promote wool world wide in their own public venues by blade shearing wool from their sheep's back then handspinning & knitting the Challenge jumper for their backs.

Substantial *funds* are also raised for *Cancer Research* World Wide.

International *Back to Back* Wool Challenge

Rules

Fund Raising for Cancer Research

Promoting Wool World Wide

OBJECTIVE:-

To complete the sweater/jumper, following the identical International Wool Challenge rules & pattern *exactly*, within a day.

1. A team consists of eight (8) members. One (1) blade shearer and seven (7) handspinners & hand knitters with up to seven (7) non electric spinning wheels. One (1) sheep, any colour or breed but must not be housed or coated for two (2) months prior to shearing.
2. With the exception of the shearer, team members shall be allowed to perform whichever function is requires within the team. Eg a member may start as a spinner and become a knitter, knitters or spinners may wind wool, members of the team may exchange roles with one another.
3. The *continuous* time starts when the shearer, holding the sheep, begins shearing. Shearing can begin from any part of the sheep.
4. An independent timekeeper and assessor are required to verify the time and that the pattern has been complied with.
5. Spinners may start spinning as soon as the wool is available.
6. Only the team members may touch the wool.
7. Scissors, handcarders, flickers or combs are not permitted.
8. A HAND ball winder tool may be used.
9. Two wool singles are plied for a 'double knit' of approximately 8 ply yarn.
10. Use oversew stitch in wool to sew up the sweater.
11. Time ends when the completed sweater is handed to the timekeeper.
12. The winning team shall be the one which produces the finished sweater in the best recorded time.

Annual Challenge
Promoting Wool World Wide & Fund Raising for Cancer Research

Sweater / Jumper Pattern

Each team will follow this International Wool Challenge pattern *exactly* as it is written. On completion, the team assessor is responsible for counting the stitches and rows.

Yarn - To be equivalent to Double Knit.

Back and Front (both the same)

Using one pair of size 10 (3.25mm) needles cast on 96 stitches.

Work 16 rows in k1, p1 rib.

Change to one pair of size 8 (4mm) needles and knit 1 row plain and 1 row purl (Stocking stitch).

Continue until 134 rows have been completed from 16 rows of rib.

(Total from cast on edge 150 rows).

Change to k1, p1 rib (still using the size 8 needles) work 12 rows.

Cast off loosely in rib.

Sleeves (Make two alike).

Using size 10 (3.25mm) needles cast on 46 stitches.

Work 16 rows k1, p1 rib.

Change to size 8 (4mm) needles and knit 1 row plain and 1 row purl (stocking stitch).

Increasing 1 stitch at each end of first and every following 4th row until 96 stitches.

Continue without further increase until 100 rows have been completed from 16 cuff rib.

(Total from cast on edge 116 rows).

Cast off loosely.

Making Up

Join Back and Front at shoulder edge (quarter of the way from the sleeve edge - leaving half of the top edge as neck opening)

Sew in Sleeves.
